What did you learn?	That it is to be a pilot (pathfinder) programme in time for start of financial year 2023 with learning to be gained through experience so as to inform future iterations.
How did the consultation shape the proposal/policy/project/plan?	General feedback provided to the Chair and SLT via the Winter roadshows and client visits throughout the year, in addition to reflecting on our experience on managing funding support so far, has helped to shape the initial funding approach. Further learning and feedback will be gathered through the implementation phase of the pilot programme.
